




# Riding Backwards on the Donkey

Nasreddin Hodja was born almost 800 years ago in the 13th century, in what is today the city of Konya in Turkey and lived much of his life in a place called Akşehir.

## WHAT WE WILL LEARN

When we read this book we will:

- Learn how to properly read punctuation marks, develop our reading abilities.
- Learn how to guess how events in a story will develop and conclude.
- Learn how to benefit from the meaning presented in the illustrations of the story.
- Learn how to find answers to who, what, when, where, why and how in what we read.
- Learn how to reinforce rules about good manners and how to behave properly.
- Learn in time the meaning of concepts and when to use them.
- Improve our vocabulary and our control of the language that we use.
- Learn how to experience what we read and how to compare and connect it to our own daily lives.
- Develop our imaginations.
- Become familiar with animal concepts and with nature.

And last but not least, we will get to meet Nasreddin Hodja!

## CONCEPTS:

When we read this book we will learn concepts such as:

- Mealtimes (breakfast, lunch, dinner)
- Animals and sounds (donkey, sheep)
  - Numbers (1-10)
- Linear concepts (before, now, after)
- Natural concepts (mountain, plain, creek, forest)
  - Sweet – Salty
  - Big – Small
  - Back – Front
  - Outside – Inside
